

MESSAGE AND PRAYER FROM NEIL



Dear Friends

Welcome to our Autumn magazine and I hope it finds you well.

I thought I would take the opportunity in my welcome message to provide you with an update on where things are with regards to the Presbytery Mission Plan and our Cluster with Burnside Blairbeth, Flemington Hallside and Cambuslang. Things are certainly moving in a positive direction in terms of the

relationships that are growing between the church leaders and the ministry opportunities the cluster is providing us. Examples include the shared Holiday Club with Burnside Blairbeth Church, and the new Bible Course which has started on Sunday evenings.

Having established a commitment to work together in the mission to our cluster area, we are now being asked by Presbytery to establish which buildings will be retained for the purpose of fulfilling this mission. It is important to note here that no discussions have taken place as yet, and there is a strong likelihood that most buildings will be retained for this purpose. Equally, before any decisions will be made on this front, wider Kirk Session and congregational involvement will be required.

In addition to establishing which buildings are to be retained, the Cluster has been asked to decide on how ministry posts will be allocated within it. Currently there are 5 full-time ministry posts working in the Cluster (each church has a full-time minister with Cambuslang also having a full time Deacon). Presbytery has allocated the equivalent of 3.5 full-time ministry posts to distribute amongst our Cluster. As you can see, this means a reduction of 1.5 full-time ministry posts. Therefore, discussions will need to take place with regards to how best to allocate the ministry posts within the Cluster. Again, no discussions have taken place as yet and this will not be an easy thing to work out, so your prayers will very much be welcomed by all involved in this process. Once again, Kirk Session and congregational involvement will be required.

While decisions will need to be made quite quickly, as the Presbytery Mission Plan is to be agreed and signed off by 31 December 2022 and work towards implementation from 1 January 2023, immediate changes are unlikely to happen. However, it will have an impact on how ministry is approached with, at the very least, one or more of the churches in our cluster not having a full-time minster by the end of the 5-year Plan's life, that is by 2026. This will, of course, dictate the direction of ministry not just for individual congregations but for the entire Cluster, as we navigate away from the model of ministry within our denomination that has traditionally seen individual congregations mainly served by a full-time minister of their own.

I realise that this is not an easy situation for any of us. If you have any questions, or would just like to have a chat, please do get in touch with me and I will try my best to answer them.

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THE BIG INTERVIEW!

One of our young folk, Keir Baird, put Neil through his paces recently by interviewing him about his role as chaplain to Rutherglen Glencairn Football Club. Read on for more information on what's involved in his role.

Keir: What started your interest in Sports Chaplaincy?

NEIL: When I became the minister at Belhaven with Spott, the previous minister had been an informal chaplain with Dunbar United FC. I was approached by the club within a few weeks of my arrival, to see if I wanted to get involved. As I really love football, I went along to the training. Quite quickly, when the club decided to make the role of chaplain more formal, I took training at Hampden and got a certificate. Having been a Sports Chaplain for 4-5 years, when I moved through to Rutherglen, I got a free transfer from Dunbar to Glencairn! This was through the director of sports chaplaincy in Scotland, Mark Fleming, who knew I was passionate about football and wondered if I would be interested in taking on the role of Sports Chaplain with Rutherglen Glencairn FC.

KEIR: Why did you decide to accept this invitation?

NEIL: I thought it would be a good way of getting to know local people that I might never come across in church. Unfortunately, Covid held things up, but I eventually met the management and the rest of the playing squad at the end of January 2022, on a squad training night at Glasgow Green.

KEIR: What was involved in your training to be a Sports Chaplain?

NEIL: The training course at Hampden included looking at the different situations you might encounter. There is also on-going training and a mental health course. That course was particularly challenging as you can imagine, with a heavy emphasis on the mental health of players and those associated with the club you are appointed to.

KEIR: What do you do in your role at Glencairn?

NEIL: There is, obviously, the pastoral side of things when you are chatting to folk who are struggling with issues. I need to make myself available to everyone associated with the club, so I try to go to training as well as to matches, in order that they can get to know me and vice-versa.

KEIR: What do you find the most enjoyable part of your role as chaplain and what is the most challenging?

NEIL: The best part has to be watching football matches and getting to know the players and the inner workings of the club. The more challenging part is that the majority of the people I work with are young guys and they can be rather suspicious of sharing things with another man who is a stranger. So, that's why it is important to build relationships and get to know them all better over a longer period of time.

Grateful thanks to Keir and Neil from the editorial team for their willingness to take part in 'The Big Interview'. Readers may be interested to know that Sports Chaplaincy has been endorsed by Sir Alex Ferguson, no less! He has been quoted as saying: 'Chaplains can be of help to all sorts of people involved with sport e.g. when crisis, need, or difficulty comes. I commend the idea of Sports Chaplaincy'. So, Neil, give it your best shot and hopefully no one will receive the hairdryer treatment from you!!

DR ROBIN STEWART 1926-2022



Dr Stewart and his wife, Dorothy joined Stonelaw Church in 2015 when they moved from Colinton in Edinburgh to be closer to their family. They integrated well into the congregation, which was evident when they received over 40 cards from the church family on the occasion of their 70th wedding anniversary in January 2022. Robin and Dorothy attended every Sunday - latterly by Zoom - and enjoyed the Stonelaw fellowship, which helped them to settle into their new home in Burnside. *Jean and Jane Miller*

The following is adapted from Dr Stewart's son Evan Stewart's tribute to his father:

"Our father was a wonderful man. He was generous, thoughtful, compassionate, loyal - a man of integrity and humility. His outlook on life was consistently optimistic and he was amazingly resilient. His sense of humour was mischievous, but never cruel.

A child of the manse, Robin Stewart was born in 1926 and educated in Aberdeen and Glasgow before studying medicine at Glasgow University. He held hospital posts in Paisley and Irvine and was determined to enter general practice, but as there was a glut of doctors returning home after the war, posts were at first difficult to obtain at that time. He therefore took up a series of assistantships in Shotts, Coventry, Dumbarton and Bellshill before finally joining a mining practice in Newmills, Fife. Robin and Dorothy, also a child of the manse, had married in 1952 and Robin wanted it known that he owed a tremendous debt to his wife, who because of the demands of general practice in those days (with no secretaries or practice nurses), gave up her career as a domestic science teacher early, to help him.

After ten years in Newmills, Robin spent almost 30 years as Assistant and later Senior Medical Officer at Moray House College of Education, where he was family doctor to students living in halls of residence and lecturer to trainee teachers and social workers. He also delivered in-service training to guidance teachers and teachers of disabled children and organised conferences for senior members of the medical and teaching professions.

Essentially, Robin was a family man who was intensely proud of his and Dorothy's children, Mary and Evan, and their four grandchildren: Katie, Anna, Morven and Cillian. Their granddaughter Anna said "I have memories of Grandpa on all fours, playing with us in our Wendy house, or filling our Nottingham home with festive joy through his carols on the piano (...) who could ask for a cooler grandpa? He was a sharp dresser, loved a colourful printed tie and always had a better iPhone than me!"

Evan continued, "Outside his work, our father's chief love was music; he was proud to have played the organ on occasion at Culross Abbey and in Morningside churches in Edinburgh. He enjoyed being a member of church choirs and latterly the Merchiston Community Choir.

He professed to dislike big social occasions, but couldn't stop chatting to people. When he disappeared to the shops and didn't return, we knew he was chatting to his latest friends in the opticians, the post office, the newsagent or in Tesco. For Dad, genuine friendships just kept spontaneously developing.

Robin Stewart was a man of intrinsic decency. For Christians, he was a shining example of living through and for Jesus. For agnostics and atheists, he was a model of how a human life can have profound meaning in itself."

MEMORIES OF BILL WILSON

Bill Wilson passed away on 22nd July 2022, at the age of 81. The recently married Bill and Sheila had moved to Rutherglen in 1965 and soon joined Stonelaw Parish Church. When their daughters Lauran and Debbie came along, the family quickly involved themselves in the busy and active church life that Stonelaw had to offer – Young Wives for Sheila, Eldership for Bill, Sunday School and Brownies for the girls.

In 1971, Bill suggested to the Church Session that a B.B. company would be an asset to the church family and soon he and his team welcomed 12 boys of secondary age to the 131st Glasgow Company of



the Boys' Brigade. The company grew quickly and Bill's officers, including his bother lan, committed a huge amount of time to the benefit of the boys, while Sheila ran the Anchor Boys for years and Lauran and Debbie became Junior Section leaders. Many of those boys, now in their 40s and 50s, have the fondest of memories of the company. Bill and his BB team left a legacy which sees the 131st at Stonelaw Church continue to this day, albeit

in a smaller capacity. The fact that it has survived at all, when many others have not, is testament to the spadework and dedication of everyone in any capacity who has ever had the privilege to be part of the company.

Another great love of Bill's was the Abbeyfield Rutherglen Society, which he supported for almost 40 years. Bill was involved in the purchase of Eastpark Mansion House from Templeton's for the princely sum of £1.00. In 1983, the newly refurbished Eastpark House opened its doors to nine residents and Abbeyfield Rutherglen was born. To his delight, Bill was able to show Prince Charles around the new state-of-the-art facility. Templeton House and McMillan House followed three years later and in 1988, an additional facility opened offering both residential and nursing care. Upon Bill's retirement from Abbeyfield in 2018, the "Extra Care" unit was re-named Wilson House in his honour.

Retiring from Larkhall allowed Bill and Sheila to return to Rutherglen United Reformed Church where they had worshipped for many years.

Sadly, Sheila passed away very suddenly in May 2018 and there followed a time of ill health for Bill. At the start of lockdown, he headed north to be with his daughter Debbie, her husband and family near Rothes. Bill learned to get around on a mobility scooter, giving him a freedom which he loved. When Bill came home to Rutherglen it was to a new but very familiar address - Flat 11 of McMillan House in Abbeyfield! It gave him a new-found energy and he loved it!!

Bill was a friend to many and a listening ear to many more. He will be greatly missed.

THE WELL NEEDS VOLUNTEERS!

Many of you will know that The Well is a multi-cultural resource centre in the heart of Govanhill. Stonelaw has a long association with the Well; we had a Retiring Offering for them in February.

"You are helping to take away my worry and get everything sorted." (Female, Spanish, aged 20-30)

"The Well is the only place that helps. You are a real blessing...Other people rely on family, but The Well is our family." (Indian couple, aged 71-80)

Do you want to help take away worries, sort problems and be a real blessing to disadvantaged ethnic minority communities in Glasgow? The Well is looking for volunteer Advice Workers. We offer free one-to-one Advice Consultations to the ethnically diverse residents of Govanhill, Glasgow. Many of our clients are disadvantaged through poverty, racism, limited English language skills, social isolation, cultural differences and simply not knowing how things work in the UK.

We aim to demonstrate God's love by providing a place of welcome, hospitality and friendship, as well as practical advice and support. Consultations can be about anything, from understanding a utility bill to more complex welfare or immigration advice. We often help families in financial crisis to access vital sources of income that they would undoubtedly struggle to get otherwise.

Our volunteer Advice Workers support people through each step of these processes, which can be stressful and daunting. Demand for our Advice Consultations is very high. Last year, despite lockdowns and restrictions, over 4000 consultations took place.

We are approaching an exciting transition to brand-new, larger premises. This is planned to increase our capacity to help more disadvantaged families every day. However, alongside the extra space, we need extra volunteer Advice Workers.

So, if you want to use your skills to make a difference, and you have a free morning or afternoon you could commit to volunteering each week, please get in touch. We are looking for people who are:

- Good communicators
- Confident in completing basic online processes
- Compassionate
- Patient

Customer-facing experience, some knowledge of the welfare system and cross-cultural experience would be advantageous, but not essential. Training will be provided.

RELEASE INTERNATIONAL ON CHINA

We had the privilege of having James Fraser from Release preaching at Stonelaw on 21st August. James is a Lead Engagement Manager with responsibility for Scotland. He preached on Psalm 56 and compared David's struggles with those experienced by modern-day persecuted Christians. It was an incredibly powerful sermon which, I



know, many of us found quite moving, but also challenging. Our retiral offering for Release on 28th August was gratefully received by the organisation. I wish to thank you all very much on behalf of James, his colleagues and the persecuted Christians supported by Release.

China. The most populous country in the world has 1.4 billion inhabitants with only 2% Christian. Release's *Voice* magazine (July–September) tells us that the Chinese authorities see Christians as a threat and, as a result, have extended their religious clampdown. Examples include not allowing churches to make their own decisions regarding finances; banning the use of the word 'Christ' on the internet; the banning of posting religious information on the internet without first obtaining the permission of their provincial government and sabotaging attempts by Christians to marry. Some church members are forbidden to contact other church members and children are forcibly taken out of their Christian school and escorted every day to a school chosen by the state.

But the church in China refuses to bow to the state's demands and is willing to accept the consequences. New Christian leaders are always stepping up. *World Magazine* (a biweekly magazine printed in the USA) was told by one of the pastors that there have been new converts, baptisms and members. In fact, since the 2018 crackdown, church growth has been 'tremendous'. There are other heartening stories, like the case of a church member who led three of his cellmates in prison to Christ. They were baptised in the sink of their prison cell!

China. The most populous country in the world needs our prayers. Let us pray that God will speak to hard hearts and reveal Himself to the persecutors; that His peace will flood the prison cells of all who are detained for His name's sake in China and that the Communist Party's attempts to control Christian education will fail.

Bob was born and raised in mainland China and today he is one of the leading voices supporting persecuted Christians there. 
