FROM OUR SESSION CLERK

I wonder what you were doing in December 2016? Many of us would struggle to recall but sometimes we come across a photo which jogs our memories. Dorothy's phone regularly does this and it's a joy to look back 7 years to when our children and grandchildren were younger.

In December 2016 our Kirk Session was thinking about a new Session Clerk, following the death of Bill Liggat. What kind of person should the Session Clerk be? What skills are needed? The perfect candidate couldn't be found - so in February 2017 elders asked me to become Session Clerk instead! I recall saying that I was happy to "take my turn". Alistair and I had a private agreement that I would serve for 3 years with the possibility of a further 3 years. How time flies when you're...

Here's some of my highlights from my time as Session Clerk:

In June 2017 "sanctuary modernisation" was first mentioned, which evolved into the Sanctuary for the Future project. At the opening service in October 2019, after this major project was concluded, I spotted some visitors among the congregation, who turned out to be a Vacancy Committee. Our minister Rev Dr Alistair May was soon called to Dalziel St Andrew's Church in Motherwell.

Our Vacancy began in January 2020 with the Rev Dr Scott Kirkland as Interim Moderator and Rev John Martindale as Locum. Later Rev Gavin McFadyen took over as Interim Moderator and Rev Tom Nelson became Locum. The Church Roll was updated, a Parish Profile drafted, and all the usual vacancy procedures were attended to. However, Covid-19 changed church life, and life in general, beyond all recognition. We learned how to wear face masks and join Zoom services at home rather than worship in the sanctuary. After Alistair left, I also liaised more closely with the Development Worker Management Group until Thérèse Reid's retirement in October 2021.

As if a global pandemic wasn't enough, Session decided to sell our vacant manse on Blairbeth Road and buy a more modern one. Meanwhile a Nomination Committee was elected and in April 2021 put forward the Rev Neil H Watson as Sole Nominee. In June we welcomed Neil and Elizabeth to Stonelaw - surely happier days were ahead?

Glasgow Presbytery had other ideas. The Presbytery Mission Plan process started in July 2021. I decided it was my Christian duty to stay on as Session Clerk and participate in meeting after meeting. These included speaking at Glasgow Presbytery and at a meeting of Glasgow Session Clerks called by the then Moderator of the General Assembly, the Right Rev Dr Ian Greenshields.

Glasgow's Presbytery Plan is now agreed, so before anything else happens, I'm taking the opportunity to step down. Our minister wishes to introduce a Joint Session Clerk structure and I warmly commend my immediate successor, William Baird, to you. We'll be working together while we seek to install the other Joint Session Clerk in the near future. Then I'll have time to repay the debt I owe my wonderful wife for her unwavering support during these often-stressful years. I'll also have more time for my next Christian adventure! If you'd like to know more, just ask about my English class at St Rollox Church in Glasgow.

PAST TIMES DEMENTIA-FRIENDLY COMMUNITY



We have a new name - and a new logo!

Did you notice? Yes, we have slightly changed our name – from Past Times Dementia-friendly Café to Past Times Dementia-friendly Community. This is to reflect the fact that we offer more than a café service to our visitors. With the help of the Community Psychiatric Nurses (CPNs) from the Older Adults Mental Health Team in the Health Centre, and the Lanarkshire Advisor from Alzheimer Scotland, we offer advice and support to our visitors and have plans to extend this further in the future. We had a few suggestions for our new name but together, the majority of our visitors and volunteers voted for what we hope will be a better

description going forward. Many thanks to Louise Mairs for updating our logo to match!

October Meeting

One of our visitors suggested that we book the Clydebank Male Voice Choir to come and entertain us. So, we got in touch and were delighted when 14 of them came along and sang for us at our October meeting. They sang some old favourites, many of which showed off their beautiful harmonies.

November Meeting

We were delighted to welcome back Gary (The Music Man) Coupland to entertain us at our November meeting. Gary brought a smile to everyone's face and confirmed himself as a Past Times favourite.

One-to-One Music Therapy Pilot Project

In October, Kim Blythe, the Nordoff & Robbins (N&R) music therapist started a six-week pilot of one-to-one therapy for our visitors living with dementia and their carers. So far, the sessions have gone extremely well, with our visitors joining Kim on the piano, singing or playing a variety of percussion instruments. We have recently heard that N & R have decided to offer us Kim's services for another 12 weeks, free of charge, so many more of our visitors will benefit from music therapy. Our Kirk Session has given approval to continue to heat Transept corner on a Wednesday throughout the months of December to February. Curtains will be hung to keep the heat into this area. (These curtains used to hang in the Creche Room. Past Times' funds will pay for the curtain rail and for two fan heaters.) None of this would be possible without the support of Stuart Menzies and the Managers. We thank you all most sincerely.

Future Plans

Along with the Minister and Session Clerk, three other Past Times volunteers (Jill Rennie, Moira Shaw and Dorothy McTaggart) and I have been looking at potential sources of funding to take us beyond January 2024, when our current funding runs out. We hope to expand our existing service, to offer more activities to improve the lives of more people living with dementia and their carers. To do this, we need a part-time paid worker; a professional, to manage and grow Past Times. We have submitted an application to the Scottish Government's Communities Mental Health and Wellbeing Fund. This will be considered in the coming weeks. We are also speaking to other funders who might offer funding beyond the 18 months covered by the CMHWF. We would welcome your prayers for the work we carry out, for our plans, and for the people who need our help.

Leanne wrote: "We as a team feel it's important for children to have these opportunities. They need to put down their phones and get out their houses and be active and social, learn new skills, develop good discipline, routine and build confidence all whilst having fun and making friends."

This request was duly considered and approved at October's Kirk Session meeting and the first Monday night dance class took place at the end of October.

Leanne has suggested the children could perhaps put on a display for the congregation. Please let us know if you would be interested.

With the addition of Monday evenings, our hall is now in use from Monday to Friday every week (during term time). I hope you will agree that, once again, it is really encouraging that this great space is being used for youth activities like this serving our community.

HEBRIDES REVIVAL CONFERENCE 2023: 'I WILL BUILD MY CHURCH'

The forecast for our crossing to the Outer Hebrides on Wednesday, 27th September was not good. However, after an overnight stay in Ullapool, the weather changed from the predicted Storm Agnes, and we sailed out through Loch Broom and out across the Minch in a flat calm.

The next day, we found ourselves huddled with our backs firmly stationed against the lighthouse wall on the Butt of Lewis. We had to! The strong westerly winds were causing the waves to crash onto the rocks on the northern shore of the island and if we hadn't been careful, we could have joined them.

We had come to Lewis to attend the 2023 Hebrides Revival Conference in Martin's Memorial Church in Stornoway and, being our first visit to the Outer Hebrides, we wanted to pay a flying visit to as many places as we could.

We attended the evening service at the Church of Scotland in Barvas, where the 1949-53 Revival started and called in at the Black House in Arnol. Then a long drive and a short visit to a rather more mountainous Harris.

Tommy MacNeil, the minister at Martin's Memorial, has a real heart for the church in Scotland, and has written the book 'The Sleeping Giant' to try to awaken the members of the Church of Scotland and set the church on fire.

However, the theme of the conference was 'I Will Build My Church' (Matt.16:18) and as he introduced us to the theme, he took a few minutes to emphasise each word:

Jesus said:

I Not 'we' or 'you'

Will Not 'could' or 'might

Build Using 'us as the living 'stones' with Jesus as the cornerstone (1 Peter 2:4)

My Not 'our'

Church. Ecclesia. A coming out from where we are and a coming together as a community.

We were familiar with the preaching of both Tommy MacNeil and Kenny Borthwick and were looking forward to hearing them talk. We enjoyed the music and marvelled at the sight of around thirty teenagers attending all seven of the one-and-a-half-hour sessions which made up the conference on the Friday night, and then all day Saturday. They then turned up for the Service on the Sunday morning.

However, although the packed church, the enthusiastic singing, the quality of preaching and the friendliness of everyone, was very encouraging, the presence of God in the building was amazing.

It is impossible to translate through the written word the beauty of what Moira and I felt during the Sunday morning service in Martin's Memorial Church. The serene, still magnificence and gracefulness of the atmosphere during the service was breathtaking.

Having heard the speakers before, at a previous conference in Perth, we knew that we would not be disappointed in the messages they would bring. However, the welcome we experienced, from people in all age groups, reinforced our feeling that the Spirit was also happy to be welcomed in Martin's Memorial Church, Stornoway.

We had travelled to Lewis with excitement but also with concern. Between 1949 and 1953, in the little village of Barvas, on the west coast, people's lives were completely changed by a revival. Could it happen again?

On the Sunday morning, Tommy asked, "Why are you here in church this morning?" We could have given many answers: I like meeting people I know. I was on door duty. I was on tea duty. I was reading the scripture. I was giving the final prayer. I love singing. I bring someone who otherwise wouldn't manage. The list of reasons goes on and on, but there is only one true answer to that question: 'Because I have been chosen.' John 15:16. However, we have been given a free will to decide to go somewhere else and ignore God when he talks.

There is no space here to try and cover each of the weekend's seven sessions, but the message from a packed church was not, 'Look what we are doing!' but 'Thank you, Jesus, for what you are doing through us.'

Prayer is a major factor in the building of the church in Martin's Memorial and we are seriously thinking of returning to Stornoway for the Hebrides Revival Conference on Friday 14th & Saturday 15th June 2024.

As the Lord Seaforth sailed out of Stornoway on yet another flat calm at the end of our week-long visit, we remembered not only the changeable weather but also the beautiful coastline. It was easy to feel secure sitting in the pet-friendly lounge in such a large, strong, steady ship. However, we had been reminded by Tommy at the end of his sermon on the Sunday morning that although Martin's Memorial Church was fairly full, with over two hundred people of all ages, Stornoway still had another six thousand people who preferred to do other things on a Sunday morning.

Lack of interest, apathy and the misuse of drugs and alcohol, were all around. Just like on the mainland.

The encouraging message we were to take away, as we travelled back to our congregations throughout Scotland, was the comforting words of Jesus, assuring us that, in both our own churches and in our local communities, in spite of all our self-centred ideas, 'I Will Build My Church'.

The editorial team would like to thank Kit's sons David and James and members of the congregation for sharing memories of her.

Many in the church family will remember Kit as a faithful Stonelaw Church and Guild member. She and her friend, the late Kay Kellock, often did tea duty together after Sunday morning services. She was a lovely, cheerful lady who was always very well-dressed.

Kit was born in Australia, but soon afterwards the family (parents Annie and Archibald Thomson and brother Donald) returned to Scotland, staying in a variety of homes in Ayrshire and Argyll. On leaving school

she attended a shorthand and typing course in Prestwick and started in her first and only job, with the Inland Revenue at an office on Pollokshaws Road. Kit met Ian Young on a night out with friends at a Glasgow University Union dance. After a short courtship they



married on 2nd August 1954, in Queens Park Church. In those days, as a married woman, Kit could no longer work for the Inland Revenue, which provided a dowry of £150.

The Youngs settled down to married life in the house Ian had built at 70 Stonelaw Drive, soon joined by sons John, David and Steven in 1955, 1958 and 1961. Kit's busy family life didn't stop her other interests: country dancing, going to the theatre and cinema, shopping for clothes, completing puzzles and crosswords. Kit was very hospitable and loved family visits, always taking a keen interest in her grandchildren's and great-grandchildren's lives.

John and his wife Joan's untimely deaths in 2009 and 2012 were a devastating blow to Kit, but still Kit remained steadfast, a constant in all the family's lives while managing her own deep sorrow. FOODBANK APPEAL TO ALL CHURCHES AND PLACES OF WORSHIP

Hi Everyone

Christmas is fast approaching, and we are preparing for the extra effort we always have to put in at this time of year.

We are also looking back at a year with unprecedented demand for the Foodbank, up by 49%, while donations have continued to drop, down by 57%. This means we are now facing a huge shortfall in our stock levels. We figured out that we need an extra 80,000 tins of food to make up for the deficit in donations! The items we need most at present are:

- Tinned meat, fish, pasta, soup, tomatoes and fruit
- UHT milk (whole or semi-skimmed)
- Jars of pasta sauce, jam and marmalade
- Sugar

We are taking in donations at the back door of our warehouse in the Rutherglen Exchange on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays during December (apart from 1 and 25 December) at 10-12 am. Access is down the lane beside Papa Joe's Pizza, in the first bay on the left. The warehouse door is in the left-hand corner of the bay, clearly labelled.

All over the world, Christians are looking forward to celebrating the birth of our Saviour, Jesus. This is a special time of year when we can mark the occasion by coming together as Christians to enjoy fellowship with one another.

However, for many of our Christian brothers and sisters, Christmas is a time when some will have to meet in secret, forced to listen to prayers on

TV with subtitles to ensure no one can hear them expressing their faith in God. Others will have to mark the occasion far from home, after being forced to flee. Many will continue to mourn loved ones they have lost in violent attacks.

Christmas can be particularly difficult and lonely for persecuted Christians. Can you imagine being totally isolated in a prison cell, unable to celebrate the birth of Jesus with others? As Christians in the West prepare to celebrate Christmas with all the trimmings, elsewhere in the world, people of faith are forced to keep their celebrations almost invisible. There are no carol concerts or Watchnight services.

In Iran, for example, it is a really dangerous and risky thing for Christians to celebrate Christmas. Many of them become creative – they find other occasions to celebrate, which act as a mask for celebrating Christmas. One Christian woman admitted that her family celebrates Christmas on her daughter's birthday in January. In this way, they are able to bring family, as well as other Christian brothers and sisters, together. They can sing and exchange gifts. By doing this, they can celebrate Christmas together, but they have a cover story!

So, as you celebrate the birth of Jesus this year, either with others or by enjoying your own company, let us remember in prayer those persecuted Christians who cannot celebrate, cannot come together with fellow believers and have to acknowledge Jesus' birth secretly.

May you know God's joy and peace this Christmas.

RUTHERGLEN TO AUSTRIA AND BACK - BY TRAIN

When Alastair and I began planning our first post-Covid foreign holiday, we were aware of the carbon footprint we'd use by flying, so we discussed the possibility of travelling by train, at least part of the way to Austria. There were no direct flights to Innsbruck in September, but we'd heard that night trains have been making a comeback in Europe. At first, we explored the possibility of flying to Amsterdam and catching a Nightjet train to Innsbruck from there, but it turned out to be impossible to travel all the way without breaking our journey

in a hotel somewhere. That would have cut into our time in Austria, as well as adding to the cost of the holiday.



After struggling to find suitable flights, I looked at The Man in Seat Sixty-One website: www.seat61.com which is a treasure trove of information and helpful links about train travel, both in the UK and abroad. This website helped us to find two pieces of good news:

- It would be possible to reach Innsbruck from Glasgow with only three changes of train,*a journey of about 27 hours in total.
- Our (Senior) Interrail passes would cover the whole journey from Rutherglen to Innsbruck! We could buy a Global Flexi Pass, which permits up to two days of train travel on the outward journey and the same again for coming home.

Suddenly, it seemed quicker, easier and less expensive than we had feared, to make the full journey by train. We would need to pay extra for our couchettes (bunks) on the Nightjet, - and also for our seats on the Eurostar, but not for a hotel - and the rest of the travelling would be covered by our Interrail passes – all the way there and home again to Rutherglen!

On a previous holiday we'd been stuck at Glasgow Airport for eight hours after our plane broke down, and another time, we missed the last direct train to our destination after taking twice as long as expected to travel from the airport to the station - so we knew that delays and cancellations can happen in any form of transport. In the end, however, we had a very smooth journey to Innsbruck and back, with only two minor delays. The trains were comfortable, apart from the shortest leg of our journey out, which was rather too crowded. And we were delighted to find that our couchette tickets on the Nightjet included breakfast!

With a sister and her family in New Zealand, I've not written off flying forever, but we've already started thinking about our next train adventure...
